

The charity Certitude recently held an exhibition at The Glades called 'SELF: Portraits in Social Care'. It featured a collection of photographs whose subjects are from London communities and benefit from social care services provided by Certitude.

The exhibition is part of a year-long awareness campaign Certitude is running at The Glades in a bid to challenge common perceptions associated with social care and the people who receive its help.
